For more than 50 years, World Vision Foundation of Thailand has remained committed to improving the quality of life for vulnerable children, families, and communities across the country. We firmly believe that every child deserves the opportunity to reach their full potential, regardless of the circumstances into which they are born or raised.

The year 2025 marks an important milestone in reviewing the implementation of our 2021–2025 Strategic Plan. This strategy has focused on holistic child development, child protection, youth empowerment, disaster response, food security and livelihoods, climate change, as well as support for migrant and vulnerable populations. Over the past five years, the foundation has worked closely with children, youth, families, communities, government agencies, the private sector, and civil society, alongside both local and international supporters, to drive sustainable positive change in Thai society.

In 2025, the organization continued to deliver measurable results through development programs implemented nationwide. Key efforts included enhancing access to education and future skills for children and youth, protecting children from violence and exploitation, strengthening families to achieve food security

and stable incomes, responding effectively to disasters and emergencies, and promoting the rights and dignity of migrant, stateless, and marginalized children—ensuring that no child is left behind.

At the same time, 2025 has been a crucial period of preparation for the new FY2026–2030 Country Strategy, set to begin in 2026. This strategy establishes ambitious goals to positively impact the lives of more than 4 million vulnerable children across Thailand through strong and sustainable collaboration with all sectors.

The new strategy will emphasize preparing children and youth for a rapidly changing world shaped by inequality, climate change, digital transformation, and economic challenges. It also aims to position the organization as a trusted “Partner of Choice” in ESG and sustainable development for the private sector and partners committed to meaningful impact.

World Vision Foundation of Thailand expresses sincere appreciation to all supporters, partners, and stakeholders. Your collaboration is a powerful force in transforming lives and building a brighter future.

As we move forward, we invite all sectors to join us in creating lasting change for every child through shared commitment and sustainable action.

In 2025, six program areas of World Vision Foundation of Thailand achieved full self-reliance and completed their projects. This reflects successful, sustainable development through collaboration among the Foundation, partners, communities, and families, driving holistic progress in education, livelihoods, and quality of life, and enabling communities to continue developing independently with strength.



Phaya Phiphak, Chiang Rai Province

Phaya Phiphak, Chiang Rai, was developed over 27 years. Results include a 4% increase in access to education, 66% of youth gained self-reliance skills, 59% of families achieved stable livelihoods, and 24 schools and learning centres were well equipped.



Tham Wiang Ka, Nan Province

Tham Wiang Ka, Nan, was developed over 28 years. Results include 100% access to higher education, 1,550 youth gained self-reliance skills, families achieved stable livelihoods, and 14 schools and learning centres were well equipped.



Dong Luang, Mukdahan Province

Dong Luang, Mukdahan, developed over 21 years. Key results: 85% access to higher education, 90% of youth gained self-reliance skills, 75% of families achieved stable livelihoods, and 45 institutions delivered sustainable learning.



Mae Suai, Chiang Rai Province

Mae Suai, Chiang Rai, was developed over 27 years. Results: 100% access to higher education, 2,080 youth gained self-reliance skills, families were strengthened, and seven schools delivered sustainable learning.



Mae Hong Son, Mae Hong Son Province

Over 23 years, Mae Hong Son achieved impact: 100% access to higher education, 85% of youth gained self-reliance skills, 72% of families achieved stable livelihoods, and 79% demonstrated positive behaviours.



Sangkhlaburi, Kanchanaburi Province

Over 20 years, Sangkhlaburi achieved impact: 100% access to higher education, more than 1,900 youth gained life skills, 19 schools were strengthened, and two sub-districts achieved more sustainable livelihoods.

OUR AREAS OF WORK

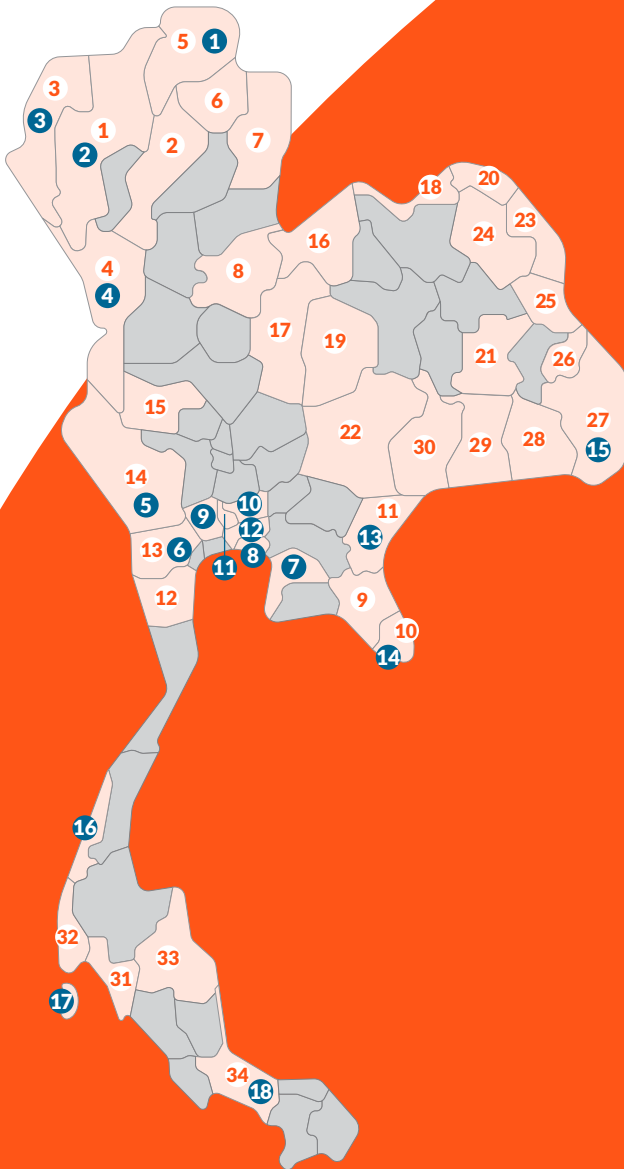

More than 263,000 children, including over 148,000 of the most vulnerable children, received support through community engagement initiatives and Child Sponsorship Programmes.



More than 63,000 children were supported through Child Protection interventions, reinforcing prevention, safety, and access to protection services.



More than 114,000 children and parents benefited from Child Development and Education programmes, strengthening learning environments, caregiver capacity, and equitable access to quality education.



134,799 migrants, including 35,493 children, gained access to essential health, protection, and legal services through targeted support for migrant and stateless populations.



More than 80,000 young people and adults participated in Youth Development initiatives, gaining life skills, leadership, and vocational capacities to act as agents of change in their communities.



More than 77,000 adults and 50,000 most vulnerable children were reached through Disaster Risk Reduction and Emergency Response programmes.



1.5 million children were reached through Advocacy programmes, strengthening awareness, participation, and policy engagement on issues affecting child well-being at national and local levels.



Emergency response efforts reached hundreds of thousands of people by delivering essential supplies and strengthening community preparedness, including **45,104 children, 74,851 parents, and 33,913 of the most vulnerable children.**

CHILD DEVELOPMENT

In FY2025, we strengthened the capacity of parents, caregivers, and communities to support the care, development, and learning of children aged 0–12. Through five childcare and home-based learning curricula implemented across World Vision programme areas, caregivers gained practical skills in positive parenting, creating happy and safe family environments, child protection, child rights, and supporting children's education. Local facilitators were also trained to share this knowledge and extend support to more families. As a result, children benefited from improved care and development opportunities, while community-based mechanisms, including home visits, helped sustain positive outcomes and empower families as the foundation of children's long-term growth, learning, and well-being.

The Golden Period of Early Childhood: Building a Supportive Community for New Parents

Early childhood is a critical stage that shapes lifelong health, development, and learning. During this period, children need proper care, nurturing relationships, and safe environments to thrive.

Five-month-old **Napattharakorn's** story highlights how parents can grow in confidence when supported by family and community networks. Through collaboration between World Vision Foundation of Thailand and the Subdistrict Health Promoting Hospital, the family received guidance from health professionals and essential support to create a safe and nurturing environment for their child.

"The more guidance and support we receive, the more confident we become in raising our child," said the father. The mother added, "This support eases financial burden and reminds us that we are not alone."

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

In FY 2025, World Vision Foundation of Thailand promoted meaningful child and youth participation, empowering children and young people to help design activities, lead projects, and influence decisions affecting their lives. Across the country, they contributed to community development, environmental initiatives, child protection efforts, and policy advocacy at local, national, and regional levels, demonstrating their role as active agents of change.

Impact in 2025



11,458 children and youth participated in youth-led programmes and activities nationwide.



1,815 young people co-developed and implemented projects to address issues in their own communities.



37,704 sponsored children participated in monitoring and providing feedback on local activities.



66,601 children and young people developed life skills and leadership capabilities.



28,536 children and youth participated in waste management and environmental activities, representing 208% of the target.



More than **10,208** parents and caregivers gained knowledge and participated in community environmental management.



10 environmental projects received 1 Gold and 9 Silver Awards.

Youth engaged in regional and international platforms, amplifying their voices in policy processes and demonstrating how meaningful participation empowers children and young people to drive sustainable change.



Children Lead, Adults Support: Sustainable Solutions to Forest Burning

Fa Porncharoen, a youth leader in Omkoi District, Chiang Mai, is helping to address forest burning and its impact on community health and well-being. Together with other young people, she engaged community members in discussing the problem and identifying solutions. Their efforts led to practical actions, including producing compost instead of burning agricultural waste, reforestation and coffee planting to restore forests, and conducting environmental awareness campaigns. As a result, haze has decreased and community collaboration has strengthened. The initiative also created safe spaces for children to share their views and contribute to local development, demonstrating how empowered young people can drive meaningful and sustainable change in their communities.

ADVOCACY

In FY 2025, World Vision Foundation of Thailand systematically advanced its advocacy work, contributing to a total of 31 policy outcomes at international, national, and local levels. These policies have the potential to generate systemic impact for more than 10,064,386 children and vulnerable populations nationwide, while benefiting over 1.5 million advocacy target beneficiaries.

Key policy areas included:



Child Protection: 15 policies



Education: 5 policies



Advocacy & Participation of
Children and Youth: 7 policies



Climate Change & Disaster
Management: 4 policies



Health: 6 policies

Policy engagement was carried out across child protection, health, education, environment, and disaster management, supporting systemic change and sustainable impact for vulnerable children and communities. The Foundation also promoted child and youth participation through platforms such as Young Minds CAMP, Regional Children's Consultation for the 2nd ASEAN Plan of Action on the Elimination of Violence Against Children, the CRVS Forum, and the National Youth Forum. These initiatives enabled children and youth to share perspectives and contribute policy recommendations to decision-making processes. In addition, the Foundation collaborated with government agencies, civil society, international organizations, and child rights networks to strengthen advocacy efforts and advance policies that support children's rights and well-being.



Young Minds CAMP 2025: Empowering Youth for Change

Youth leaders from World Vision Foundation of Thailand joined peers from eight countries at Young Minds CAMP 2025 in Bangkok to explore migration issues through workshops and policy discussions. **Ming-Sasawat** and **Pang-Sirima** shared perspectives from their communities and proposed solutions to strengthen child rights and community development. Pang emphasized the importance of including children's voices in decisions affecting migrants and vulnerable groups. The initiative highlights the Foundation's commitment to empowering young people to move beyond being affected by social issues to becoming active contributors to policy dialogue and positive change at national and regional levels.

FOOD SECURITY, LIVELIHOODS AND CLIMATE ACTION

In FY 2025, World Vision Foundation of Thailand improved children's well-being by strengthening household economies and resilience. The Foundation supported families to increase their income, reduce household expenses, and improve food security while building self-reliance. Efforts focused on three approaches: enhancing knowledge of disaster risk management and climate change adaptation, developing vocational and financial management skills, and providing production inputs, access to funding, and community support mechanisms. As a result, households, particularly the most vulnerable, became more resilient and experienced improved living conditions and greater capacity to support their children's development and well-being.

Key Results



410 vulnerable children and **812** adults received agricultural support and climate adaptation training to strengthen resilience and adapt farming practices to changing environmental conditions.



4,913 children and **6,874** caregivers gained vocational, resource management, and production skills, strengthening household livelihoods and self-reliance.



Through partner networks, **3,672** children, **2,796** vulnerable children, and **2,626** adults received production inputs and co-funding, strengthening household resilience and expanding opportunities.



A Light That Transformed Hom's Life and Family

Hom, a school-aged girl supported by World Vision Foundation of Thailand, lived with her family on a palm plantation without electricity or proper sanitation. Her father's unstable income made daily life difficult, and the children studied by lamplight while lacking access to a safe toilet. Through sponsor support, the Foundation provided a solar power system and a hygienic toilet, improving safety, health, and dignity for the entire family. Children now have reliable lighting for studying and better living conditions. *"Now we have electricity and a toilet. I can do my homework safely,"* Hom shared. This simple support has created lasting change and brighter opportunities for her future.

HUMAN MOBILITY AND MIGRATION *



In FY 2025, cross-border movement and protracted displacement continued to affect the well-being and future prospects of migrant families. In response, World Vision Foundation of Thailand implemented an integrated approach across 18 provinces, addressing the needs of children and families through health services, legal identity support, life-saving assistance, and the protection of fundamental rights. Working at both policy and community levels, the Foundation strengthened long-term support systems that promote inclusion, safety, and access to essential services. This approach recognizes migration as a family-wide experience that requires comprehensive, equitable, and sustainable solutions.

Impact

-  **108,312** people accessed health services (including 31,747 children).
-  **67,282** people received health education.
-  **10,070** people accessed HIV testing services.
-  **91%** of people living with HIV received continuous treatment.
-  **11,302** people received standard diagnostic services.
-  **1,166** tuberculosis patients received treatment, achieving an **89%** treatment success rate.

-  **42,101** people screened for malaria; **981** people received treatment.
-  **13,100** insecticide-treated mosquito nets distributed.
-  **447** migrant workers gained knowledge of their rights.
-  **15** migrant worker volunteers strengthened capacity to support communication and reduce language barriers.
-  **25,954** people supported in developing their legal identity status **3,735** stateless children and youth reached.



One Card That Changed a Life

Warinthip, or “Ing Ing,” grew up in Chiang Mai without legal status, limiting her access to education, healthcare, travel, and other fundamental rights despite her dream of becoming a nurse. World Vision Foundation of Thailand supported her through guidance, documentation assistance, and coordination with government authorities. As a result, she received a “00 card,” opening access to essential services and new opportunities. Ing Ing describes gaining legal identity as a life-changing turning point that gave her hope, dignity, and a clearer future. Today, she is pursuing her dream and hopes to help others facing similar challenges access the same opportunities.

In FY2025 marks the final year of our previous strategy and an important step towards the FY2026–2030 Country Strategy, guided by **BOLD HOPE**—the belief that change is possible and the commitment to turn that hope into action. Through **MAKE HOPE REAL**, World Vision Foundation of Thailand seeks to ensure every child can experience **Life in All Its Fullness** within safe, supportive, and opportunity-rich families and communities.

Developed through consultations with more than 300 children, youth, community members, and partners, the new strategy responds to the evolving challenges facing vulnerable children. By 2030, the Foundation aims to contribute to **sustainable improvements in the lives of 4 million children, especially the most vulnerable**, across 35 provinces.

Our work will focus on four priorities:

- **Child Protection:** Protecting children from violence, exploitation, and disasters.
- **Education and Life Skills:** Preparing children and youth for future opportunities.
- **Health and Nutrition:** Promoting healthy development and access to healthcare services, including for migrant children.
- **Sustainable Livelihoods and Climate Resilience:** Strengthening household incomes, food security, and community resilience to climate and disaster risks.

The Foundation will also expand the use of data, digital technology, and innovation to enhance transparency, effectiveness, and impact while reinforcing its role as a trusted partner for child well-being and sustainable development.

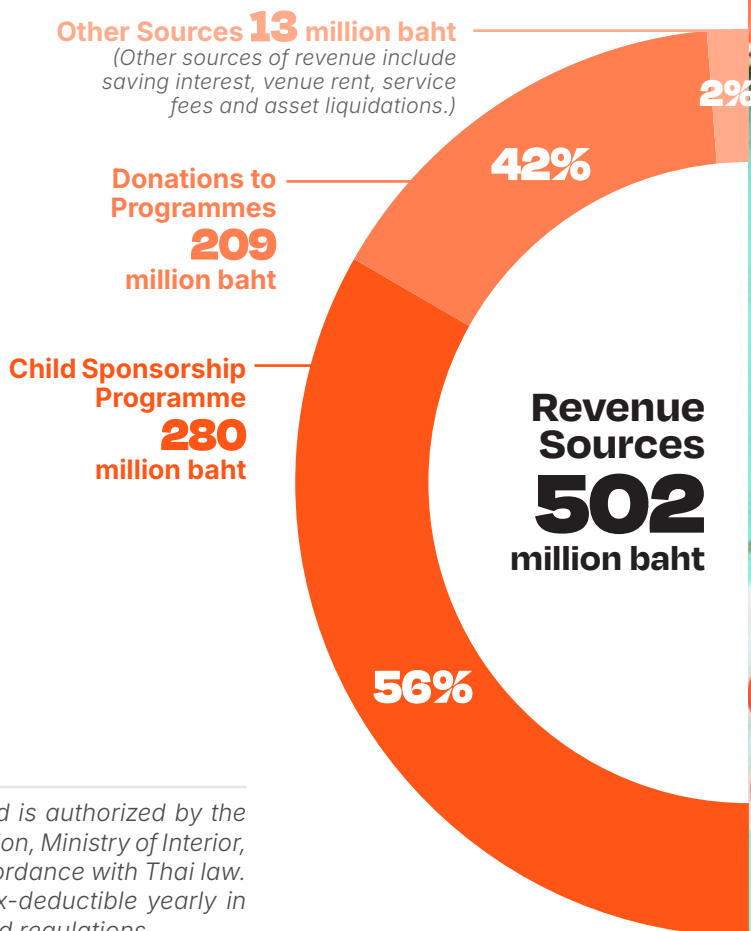

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

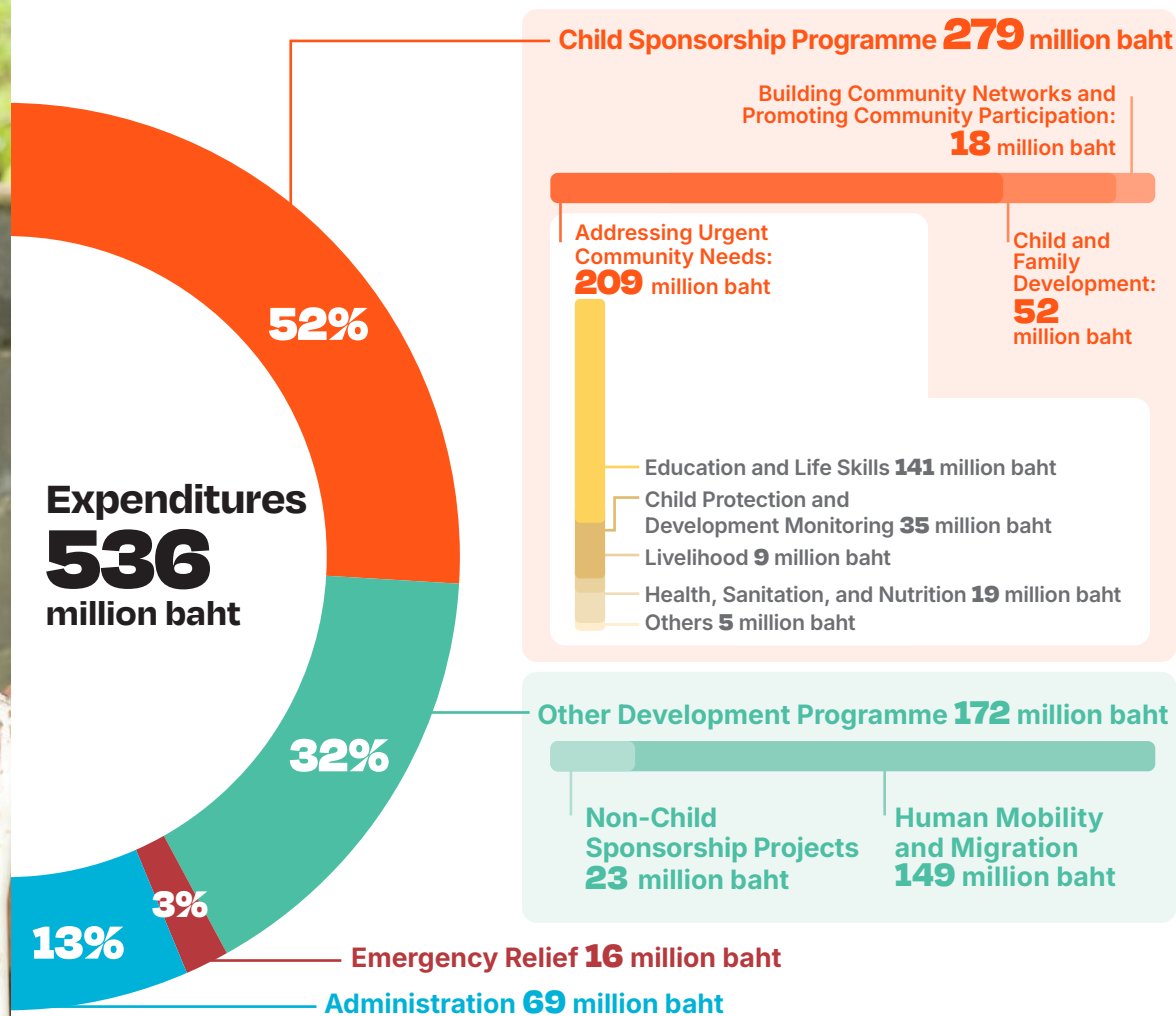
